


Woolton Walking Tour

Follow John Lennon's footsteps to explore his childhood places



Key

- 1 Strawberry Field
 Site of the former Salvation Army children's home where John
 Lennon used to play as a child.
- 2 Woolton Hill Service Reservoir This is the highest point in Liverpool at 292ft/89m!
- 3 Reynolds Park
 One of the parks where John and friends would spend their time.
- 4 Bishop Martin C.E. Primary School Once a big field, where the Quarrymen played at the summer fete and Paul first saw John perform!
- 5 St. Peter's Church
 This is where John Lennon used to attend Sunday school and sometimes ring the bell. You might recognise St Peter's Church from the film 'Yesterday'.
- 6 St. Peter's Churchyard
 In the grounds you will find
 the graves of Uncle George
 (Aunt Mimi's husband) and Eleanor
 Rigby. It is claimed that the grave
 inspired the song, but who knows?
- 7 St. Peter's Church Hall
 Where it all began! John and Paul
 met for the first time at St Peter's
 Church Hall on 6th July 1957. If you

- **8** Woolton Picture House This single screen cinema opened in 1927. John and his friends would come here to watch comedies and westerns.
- Woolton Baths The community swimming baths.
- 10 Woolton Library This Grade II listed building is the local library.
- 1 Dairy Cottage Once owned by Uncle George. John stayed here with his mother Julia from 1942 to 1943.
- 12 The Old Ouarry This guarry provided the red sandstone you will see in buildings across the city, such as Liverpool Anglican Cathedral.
- 13 Original Ouarrymen Nigel Walley's house
- 14 Ivan Vaughn's childhood home Ivan was responsible for introducing John and Paul.
- 15 251 Menlove Avenue 'Mendips' John used to live here with his Aunt Mimi.
- Calderstones Park Optional detour! Otherwise known as 'Colly Park', this is where John would hang out as a teenager.
- 1 Strawberry Field This is where the walking tour ends. Come and enjoy a bite to eat in the Imagine More café and have a browse of our giftshop!

Previously a Salvation Army children's home where John Lennon found solace playing in the gardens as a child, Strawberry Field is now a visitor centre complete with exhibition, garden, café and gift shop.

Explore John Lennon's childhood places using Strawberry Field as a base. You are welcome to park in our free car park and use our amenities. Why not begin your tour in our visitor exhibition and learn the history of Strawberry Field and why John Lennon found it so inspiring.
